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I'm grateful to so many for my recovery...

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y name is James. There are no
words to describe how I feel
today compared to how I lived my
former life. In college I was a cheerleader
and I got straight As. But that seems like
an eternity ago now. That's because
my life soon spun out of control
because of my addiction to

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because of my addiction to methamphetamines. I was shooting up the drug faster than I could manufacture it. I considered myself to be "the best cook in town." My girlfriend and I would swallow up to 25-30 ecstasy pills on a weekend. Ecstasy has a tendency to induce euphoria. For me, the result was a ruined life.

I knew I was going downhill fast. I was caught making meth twice, and I spent six months in jail. It was only through the Lord's blessing that I received three years' probation. I could have been behind bars for a long, long time.

I was an expert at poisoning people

When I think of the poison I put into my body, the bodies of others, *I'm appalled*. I would often have a mixture of Sudafed, lithium and Coleman fuel in a Gatorade bottle and I'd toss it away. But here's the terrible part. If some kid were to pic!

terrible part. If some kid were to pick up that bottle and drink it, he or she would be dead. I regret

or she would be dead. I regret all I did to hurt so many.

Perhaps you can see why I appreciate the Chattanooga Rescue Mission so much. Dale Grisso visited me in jail — something for which I'll always be grateful. Here at the Mission, I'm enjoying the Bible classes

and the structure I continue to need in my life. I'm happy to say I'm now at UTC and doing well in my classes. My goal is to get an MA in biblical studies and to do what I can to help feed hungry

folks who are in such need.

I'm grateful to so many for my recovery: to God, the Mission staff, my fellow residents and to you who give so much of your money and time to help us all move in the right direction. If there were no donors there would be no Mission. And without this place, there's no telling where I'd be today. I just wish I'd come here sooner.

hen our residents realize there is hope for their lives, something happens deep inside. They keep going on, no matter what. Hope gives them courage, strength, vitality, power. Those who place their hope in a living, resurrected Lord always seem to come through. That is the message of Easter. But when you're hooked on a feeling or a drug, hope diminishes quickly. In my experience, folks usually need to hit rock bottom before real change can take place in their lives. We don't have any magic words or formula. We don't have the power to fix anyone. But once a man or woman realizes that need for change, then and only then can there be a transformation. That's when old things pass away and all things become new.

You are helping people break the pattern of self-destruction

With your help, I'm happy to say we see people break the pattern of a life of sin and self-destruction every day. It's a great joy to see smiles on faces that once were dejected. Over time we hear our guests saying things like, "I'm starting to like myself...I now know there's hope for me...I realize I have value regardless of how I lived my former life."

This is when hope becomes practical. Families are restored. Our guests go back to school, acquire new job skills and become involved with a church that

encourages them in their new walk with Christ.

And isn't this what we all want? A closer walk with our resurrected Lord and a renewal of our minds? Without your generous support people like James might still be in his meth lab or in jail. But he's not in jail. He's getting on with his life because he's discovered hope in his relationship with God.

Right now we have even greater needs here in our new facility. But we know God will continue to honor our decision to live by faith as we extend our compassion to even more who have lost their way. Come pay us a visit. Witness your compassion firsthand. Talk with our guests. When you do, there's a good chance you'll walk away saying, "I never really knew how much good the Chattanooga Rescue Mission is doing in our community."


#### **Investing in a Life**
